#### HOARDINGS





You will have seen branded hoardings going up last month around the site. This is to help smarten up the area for you whilst necessary work takes place, and to help explain the changes that are coming. Further branded hoardings will also be erected, including a special community hoarding that is already in place in the middle of the blocks with artwork created by local community groups alongside an artist, and will also feature living contributions from pupils at the St Mary & All Saints C of E Primary School.

#### April 2022

Piling to be completed for foundations of new homes

> This will create unavoidable noise, but will be completed in compliance with planning requirements and only within working hours.

Virgin media to move cables

Disruption may be experienced by a small number of residents

SSE to move cables

Short power outages expected at 193 and 205 Wensley Road - SSE will write to residents in advance with exact dates

Construction of new homes to begin NEXT

> There will be some unavoidable construction noise during this period.

**Construction of new road behind Block 203** 

There will be some unavoidable construction noise during this period.

Bus shelter to be erected at the temporary stop to the south of 52 Lesford Road.

> This will remain in place for the duration of the construction

Remaining hoarding imagery to be erected

Part of this will be designed by children from the local community.

# MEET THE WENSLEY ROAD ESTATE WARDENS



Hi I'm Ryan, and I've been a Housing Estate Warden since December 2021.

Residents may see me out on patrol between the Coley Tower Blocks and Shaw Road. Whilst patrolling we look after your estate and deal with offences like fly-tipping, dropping litter and vehicles parked in restricted areas. We also log any repairs needed that we come across. Our ultimate objective is to ensure those who live, work and visit feel safe and welcome in Coley and we work with a range of council departments and partner agencies to achieve that.

Come and say hello if you see me when out and about - you can talk to me about any housing queries or concerns you may have from anti-social behaviour to building cleaning and crime prevention.

There's a real community spirit here, so it's brilliant to be a part of this improvement project that will greatly benefit the local community.



Hi I'm James, and I'm new to the role of Housing Estate Warden for Coley having joined in March.

I like to maintain a high visibility presence to the community through foot patrols. We typically deal with issues like fly tipping, obstructive vehicles and antisocial behaviour; however, our role can extend beyond that! Typically you'll see me around the estate or towers, sometimes with the Environmental Officer who keeps the towers and estate clean and tidy and a better place for the residents to live.

If you see me around feel free to ask for help around any issues concerning Council housing, the estate itself or the development of Coley. Ryan and I and will be happy to answer your questions or point you in the right direction!

I am excited to be part of the development across Coley, especially for the towers. I believe the new windows and new external fabric on the way will completely transform the towers for the better!

# HELP US TO STOP FLY TIPPING AND KEEP OUR NEIGHBOURHOOD NICE FOR EVERYONE

Items of bulky waste are being left around the estate which has a negative impact for all local residents. We are looking at bringing in a free bulky waste collection service in the summer and will provide more details in a future newsletter, but in the meantime please don't dump your waste. We have CCTV in operation, and action will be taken against offenders which could lead to a maximum penalty of an unlimited fine and/or up to a five year custodial sentence.
